6.4.1 Brief History of the B.Sc. (Hons.) Community Science Degree Programme

Home Science in India has a short history. Between 1920's and 1940's, under the British administration, the concept of Home Science was limited and referred to as Domestic Sciences, Domestic Economics and Household Craft, introduced mainly in secondary schools.

Baroda became a significant nucleus of Home Science in 1950 when the 1st Faculty of Home Science was established. In mid-1960 and 70's another land mark was made where the Agricultural Universities were established in most of the States. Home, being an important unit of production and consumption, the need of Home Science education was recognized in most of the Agricultural Universities and many Home Science Colleges were started. Keeping in view the crux of Marathwada region and the dearth of educational facilities for upgrading and improving rural living standards, Home Science education became a part of Agricultural Universities since 1970 due to its pivotal role in promotion of quality living in an agrarian families. The mandate of Home Science education in Agricultural Universities emerged due to the increased awareness about the women's contribution in family welfare and at economy front.

The Government decided to establish an Agricultural University at Parbhani, as it is centrally located in Marathwada for the development of agriculture in Marathwada region. Marathwada Agricultural University was established on 18th May 1972. Recently the nomenclature is expanded as Vasantrao Naik Marathwada Krishi Vidyapeeth to develop agri-allied technologies and to fulfil the needs of this region. Considering the basic needs of agriculture, the University started various levels of higher education (UG, PG, Ph.D.) in Agriculture, Food Technology, Agricultural Engineering, Home Science, Horticulture, Agricultural Business Management and Agri. Biotechnology.

Maharashtra State has four Agricultural Universities. Out of these four, VNMKV is privileged to have the College of Community Science as one of the constituent colleges working for the upliftment of rural and urban families/communities.

The College of Home Science was established in the year 1976 as one of the constituent Colleges of the Vasantao Naik Marathwada Krishi Vidyapeeth, Parbhani. Initially, the College used to offer undergraduate programme of 3 years duration from 1976 to 1997. Later on, during 1998-99 it was switched over to 4 years (3+1) UG programme with more focus on vocationalization for creating lot of self-employment opportunities. Since 2002-03, it was shifted to 2+2 B.Sc. (Hons.) degree programme. The Home Science curriculum was revised in 2007 as per the recommendations of IV Deans Committee. Further since 2012-13 the Experiential Learning Programme has been implemented at under graduation level to strengthen the professionalism in students. Further during the year 2017-18, as per the recommendations of V Deans Committee, the nomenclature of Home Science is changed as Community Science and it was shifted to 3+1 B.Sc. (Hons) Community Science degree programme by considering the changing trends in job market and needed skill development for creating more avenues for self-employment and start-up India.

Objectives

- To develop an understanding of the nature, scope and philosophy of Community Science education and its role in the development of agriculture and rural communities in the large context of national development.
- To understand the dynamics of family living with special reference to wholesome development of individuals and their empowerment for quality living.
- To produce graduates well equipped with Community Science knowledge and skills in their specialization to meet job requirements in Government and Non-government sectors at state and national levels and to meet family needs for quality living.
- To develop research and extension education abilities in students for carrying out innovative research and extension activities for achieving quality life and enhancement of economic status of the people.
- To develop entrepreneurial knowledge and skills in students for taking up gainful self-employment and to become job providers rather than job seekers.
- To upgrade the infrastructure facilities for providing quality hands on learning experiences.

Accomplishments

From the inception of this faculty, total 931 undergraduate students completed their education successfully and contributing towards families, educational and research institutes, health clinics and in various Government and Non-government organizations. The faculty had implemented several innovative research and extension projects either independently or in collaboration with many reputed institutions. Some of these projects were financed by national and international agencies like ICAR, DST, RGSTC, MCAER, RSVY, FAO, UNDP, NWDPR, NATP etc. All India Coordinated Research Project has been implemented in the College in all the 5 departments since 1997. Many books, booklets, folders, research & technical articles, audio-visual aids were developed and published by the faculty for

disseminating scientific information related to community science education in rural, slum and in urban families. Besides these, many radio programmes were broadcasted for reaching to the unreached at large scale. In addition to these, many need based training programmes, certificate courses and workshops were conducted for the upliftment of the families. The Faculty runs Lab. Pre-Primary School since 1976 and Child Guidance & Family Counselling Clinic since 1991. Subsequently Teens Guidance and Counselling Clinic; Family Guidance and Counselling Clinic, Nutri-Health Clinic and Physical Fitness Clinic were established for the welfare of the community.

6.4.5 Conduct of Practical and Hands on Training

The practical and hands on trainings are conducted in the respective department's laboratories. The practicals are conducted as per lesson plans by using the requisite instruments and facilities. The techniques are demonstrated to the students and then the students do the laboratory experiments. Practical for many of the courses are based on preparation and collection of samples to be placed in the record books; the students actually prepare these samples for the record books. Manuals for most of the courses are made available to the students for following the procedures, thereby providing a clear concept of the practical to be carried out. For few courses, the students are expected to put up exhibition of the products developed by them during the semester, for e.g. Flower arrangement,

Accessories developed, Garments stitched, Educational play material & literature developed for children, so on and so forth. Besides these, field visits are planned to various institutes/organizations based on the curriculum.

6.4.1 Brief History of the Degree Programme

Home being an important unit of production and consumption, the need of Home Science education was recognized in most of the Agricultural Universities and many Home Science Colleges were started. Keeping in view the crux of Marathwada region and the dearth of educational facilities for upgrading and improving rural living standards, Home Science education became a part of Agricultural Universities since 1970 due to its pivotal role in promotion of quality living in an agrarian families. The mandate of Home Science education in Agricultural Universities emerged due to the increased awareness about the women's contribution in family welfare and at economy front.

The Government decided to establish an Agricultural University at Parbhani as it is centrally located in Marathwada for the development of agriculture in Marathwada region. 6.4.1 Brief History of the Degree Programme

Home being an important unit of production and consumption, the need of Home Science education was recognized in most of the Agricultural Universities and many Home Science Colleges were started. Keeping in view the crux of Marathwada region and the dearth of educational facilities for upgrading and improving rural living standards, Home Science education became a part of Agricultural Universities since 1970 due to its pivotal role in promotion of quality living in an agrarian families. 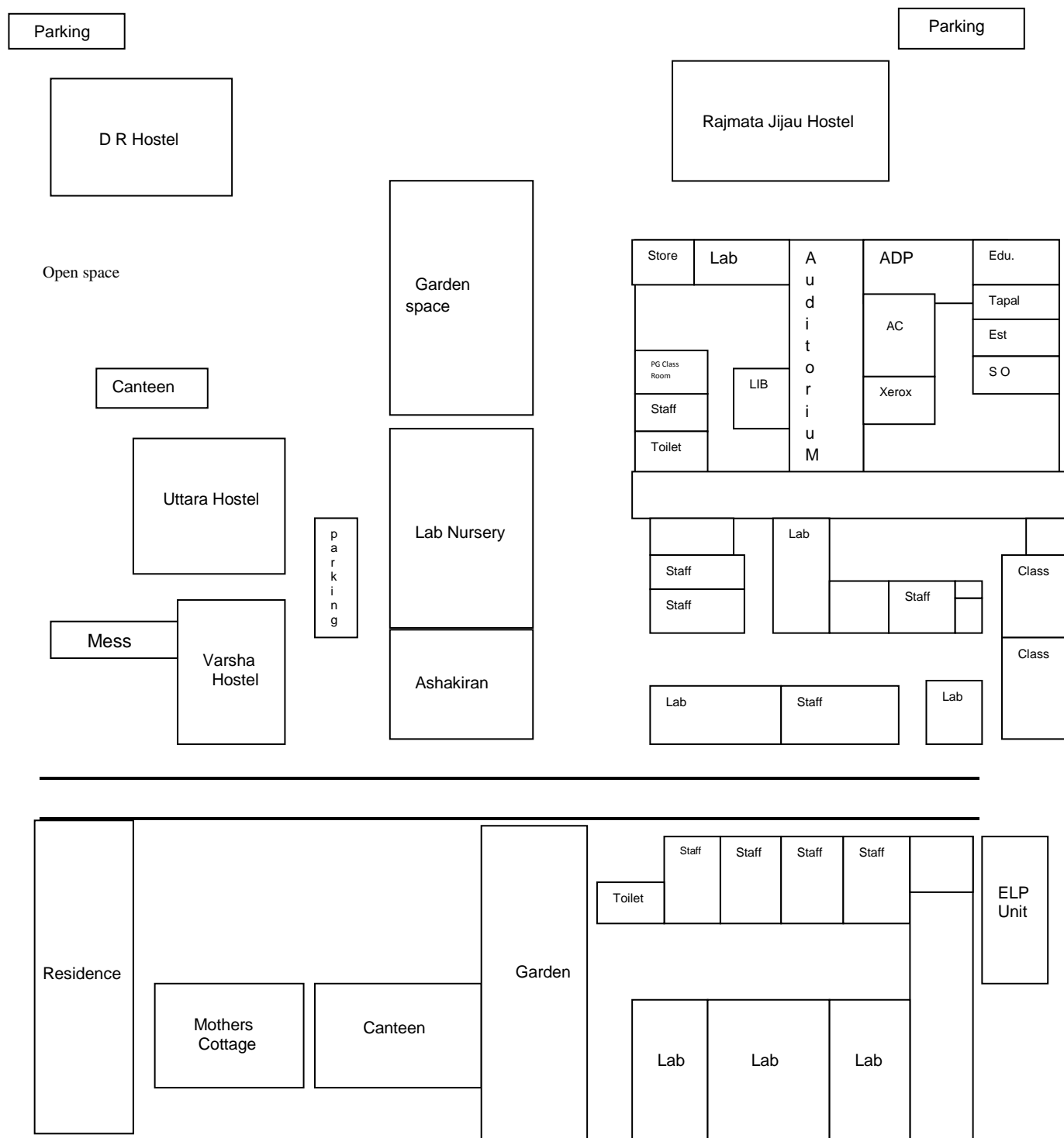

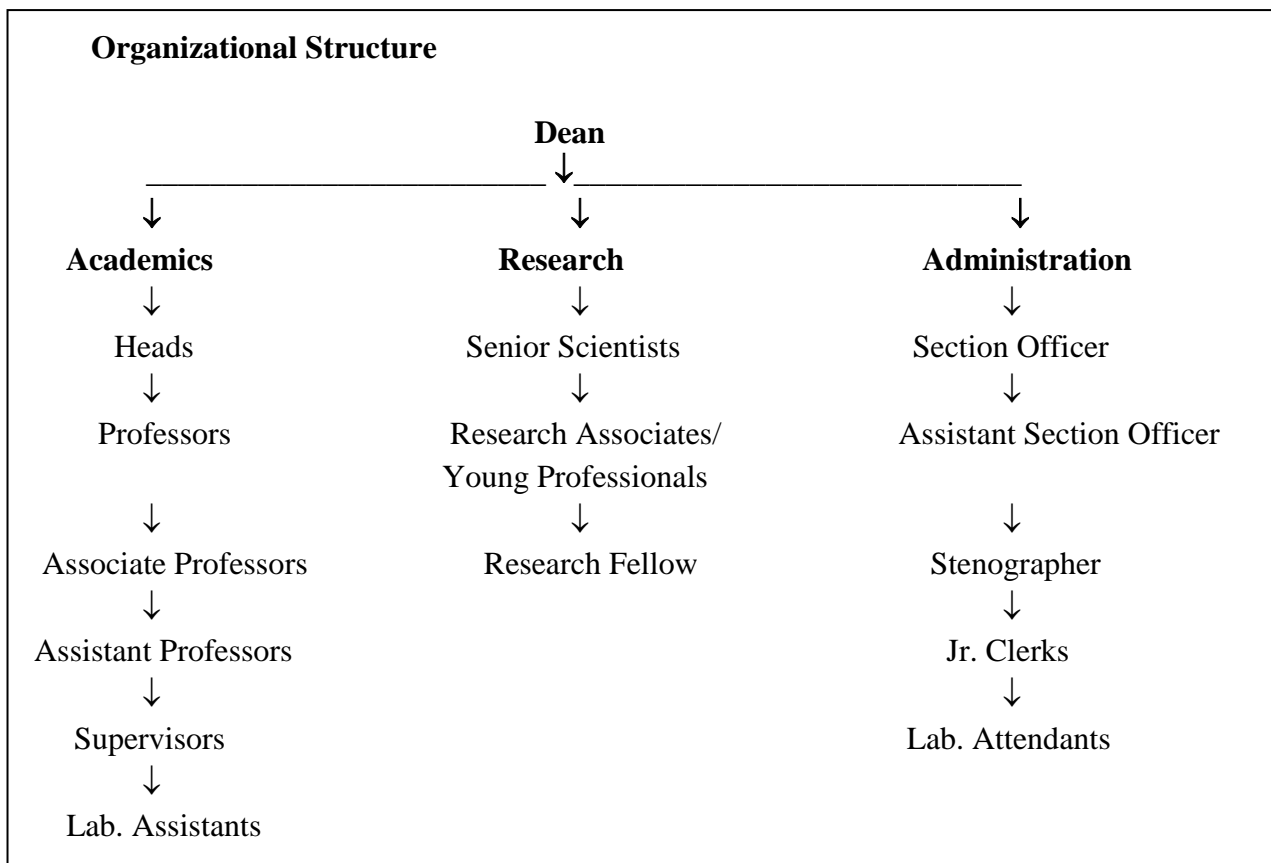

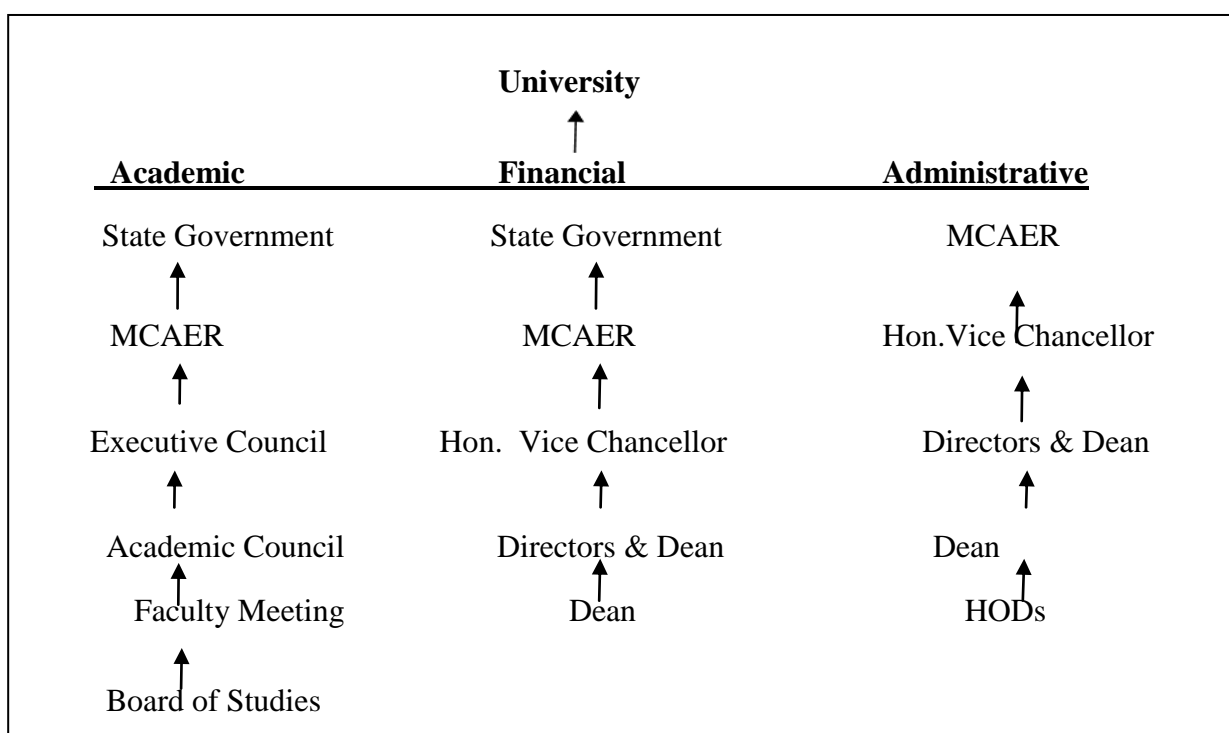

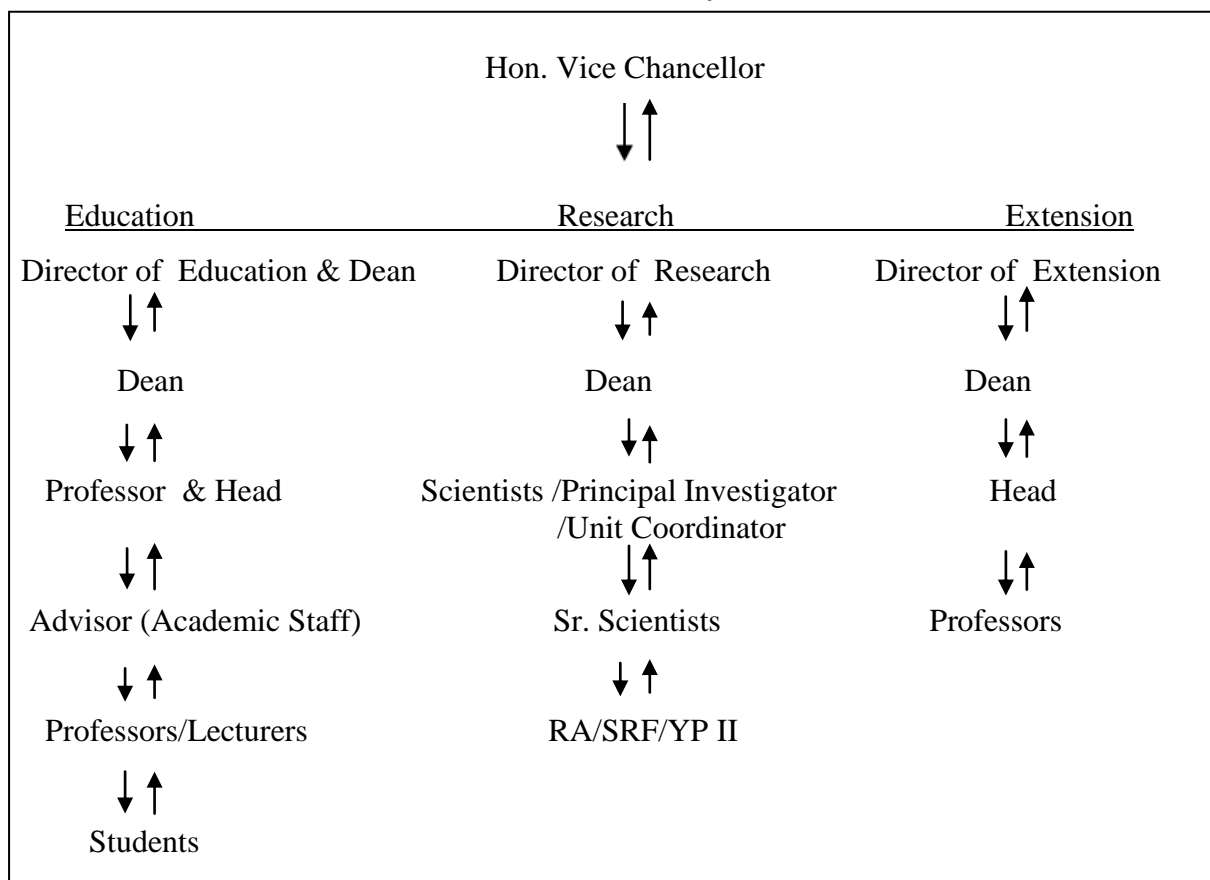

Internal Complaint Committee

6.5.4.4 Conduct of Practical and Hands on Training

- Blue Print of UG Curriculum is prepared for the effective implementation of ICAR V Deans Committee Recommendation and is implemented from the Academic Year 2017-18. The credit load of 167 is increased now to 181 with increased practical exposure as the degree programme is transformed as a Professional Degree.
- The facilities and equipments / psychological tests / lab furniture / lab flooring in the Child Development and Family Counselling Clinic, Laboratory Pre-Primary School, Food Science Lab, Dyeing and Printing Lab, Space Designing Lab and Students Computer Lab are updated, upgraded, expanded and renovated with ICAR Development Grants as well as University Revenue. One ICAR financed ELHT (HDFS) Project and one ELP Apparel Designing Project are also implemented from 2008 and 2013. Both the respective units are highly beneficial for imparting professional skills to the students.

- Special efforts are made to improve the quality and conduct of 100 per cent theory and 100 per cent practical with innovative teaching aids and techniques.
- The RAWE Programme was implemented in different villages during this period viz. Italapur, Sayala and Pandhari. The students were directly exposed to rural community situations and gain first-hand experience about it.
- The RHWE and Experiential Learning Programme in VII and VIII semester was included in the syllabus since 2017-18. In new syllabus, as per V Deans committee, the practical components like ELP, RHWE and Placement are incorporated to cater the needs of stakeholders.

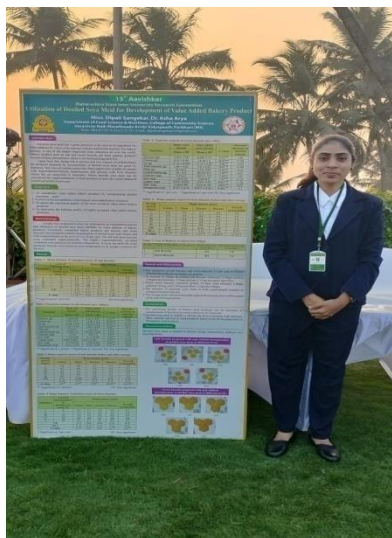
